The challenges of daily life are different for each of us but no-one is unaffected. As Christians we have the privilege of coming to God with our prayers and concerns for each other.

As part of the Body of Christ in this world our members are involved in all aspects of community life. The suggestions below may help as you pray for our work and witness in the current situation.

Healthcare

Pray for nurses and support staff working in hospitals and GP surgeries

Give thanks for the care and pastoral they provide in these difficult times

Remember those still travelling to work and others currently working from home

Care homes

Pray for managers, care workers and residents in local care homes

Give thanks for the care and support that is provided often in difficult circumstances

Remember issues surrounding the provision of protective equipment to staff

Public services

Pray for bus drivers, postal workers, police, council staff and maintenance contractors

Give thanks for the ongoing provision of public services

Remember those facing increased levels of risk to their personal safety and well being

Business and commerce

Pray for those who are working from home and for those continuing to travel daily

Give thanks for those maintaining food supplies and financial systems

Remember those with financial worries due to the closure of many businesses

Education

Pray for pupils, parents and staff during the Easter holiday period

Give thanks for the ongoing childcare provision for the children of keyworkers

Remember those suffering financial hardship due to the closure of local schools

Self-Isolation

Pray for the shielded group, for the medically vulnerable, and for older members

Give thanks for everyone providing support to those isolated in their homes

Remember council staff with the responsibility for organising community support
